"Love at first sight" must have been Harry's motto, for when he saw Jane he forgot his wedding and decided to stay and play cowboy.

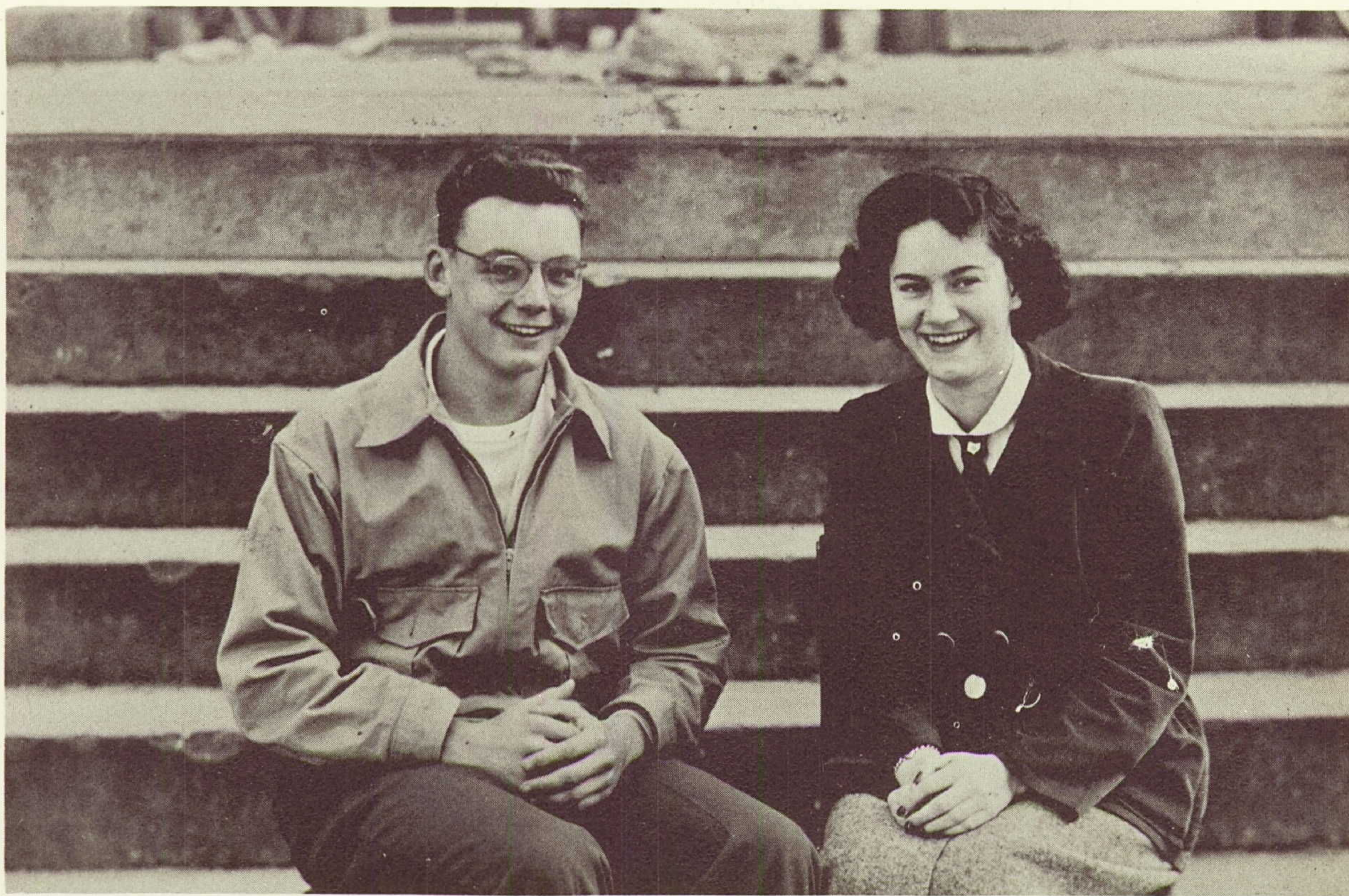

Buckeye Girls' State and Buckeye Boys' State

Each year the American Legion and Auxiliary of Garrett-Reist Post No. 503 send two outstanding Juniors to BUCKEYE BOYS' STATE and BUCKEYE GIRLS' STATE. Last year Mary Lou Russell and Charles Wolfersberger had the honor to be chosen. Let's let them speak for themselves----

"When I arrived at Girls' State, I was greeted by girls carrying posters, pamphlets, and petitions. We held elections for city, county and state offices. At night there were important speakers for us to listen to. I was a member of the city council, and the city health nurse. As a member of the city council, I helped draw up the charter for "Catherwood City", (Girls' State was divided into ten cities, two counties and one state. There were approximately forty girls in each city.) We girls were thrilled to be invited to the governor's mansion for tea and also to meet the governor at the state capitol. We also had an inaugural dinner the night that the state officers took the oath of office. I never thought that I would have as much fun as I had the week I was at BUCKEYE GIRLS' STATE."

At the beginning of the year, we sold magazines and made a considerable profit from them.

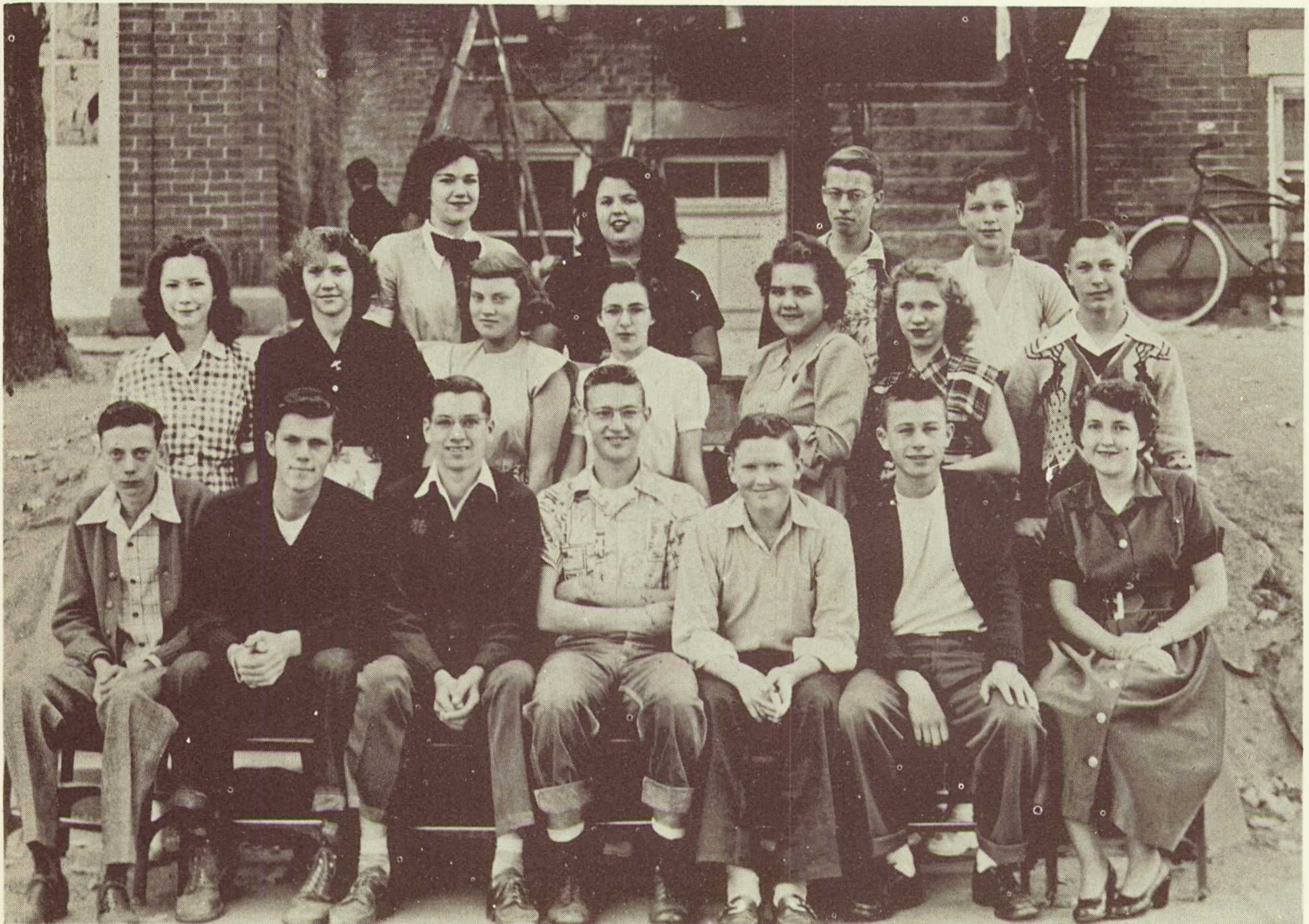
The class parties were held in the spring due to basketball.

Religious Education Classes

The two hundred eighty-six pupils who with the permission of their parents took part in the Tuesday Bible Classes this year sponsored by the Northern Richland County Council of Religious Education, didn't always remember to bring their Bibles or do their assignments, but those who were faithful were always willing to share with the others.

In each class we aimed to have a period of Bible instruction, a period of worship in song. Bible verses and prayer, and a period of expression and drill in which we attempted to make the lesson practical to the children's various needs. This was done through discussion, handwork, visual aids and outside assignments.

The first and second grades studied themes of Children of the Bible and God's care. The third and fourth grades learned of God's faithfulness through studying the Children of Israel. The Life of Paul presented a challenge to choose and stand up for the right at any cost to the fifth, sixth and high school classes.

Only those free the last period of the day and desiring to, participated in the high school class. Besides the regular instruction, certificates were issued to those who memorized certain Scriptures and songs.

It was impossible to adequately meet the child's moral and spiritual needs in the thirty or forty-five minutes of weekly instruction or even with the co-operation of the regular teachers during the week. But we hope it will stimulate a desire to continue learning about God and the Life offered by His Son in the church and in the home.
