Butler proved unequal to the Pilgrims as the Pilgrims beat the Bulldogs in both contests, 40-36 and 56-45.

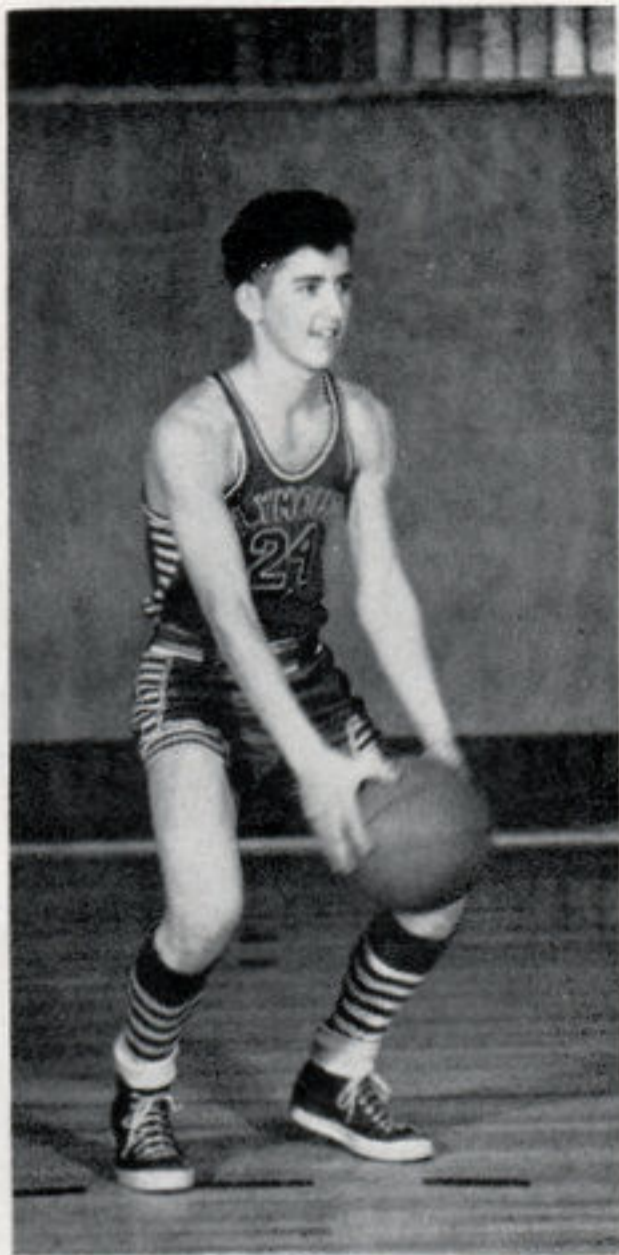
